
Summary:

With thirteen thousand six hundred residents Congleton West is the third largest ward in Cheshire East. The age profile of the ward is slightly older than average with one in five residents being of retirement age.

Both average household income and house prices are similar to Cheshire East levels, although they are slightly lower than the average for Congleton Local Area Partnership. A high proportion of households are inhabited by a single occupier.

The rate of crime is below average. Recent education results at KS4 (GCSE level) are above average, results at KS5 (A level) are slightly below average.

Age Structure






For any value/circle which lies to the left of the centre line – the Cheshire East average – the area is worse than average, any value to the right of the centre line is better than the average.

The supergroups have been created to provide a high level overview of an area and are constructed by These groupings are;


