

Summary:

With thirteen thousand residents, Congleton East is the fourth largest ward in Cheshire East. The age profile is very similar to the Cheshire East average, with around two out of three residents being of working age.

Both average household income and house prices are similar to Cheshire East levels, although they are slightly lower than the average for Congleton Local Area Partnership. Around one-third of households are inhabited by a single occupier.

Crime rates are slightly above average. Recent education results, whilst good by national standards, are below the Cheshire East average.

For any value/circle which lies to the left of the centre line – the Cheshire East average – the area is worse than average, any value to the right of the centre line is better than the average.


